Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) has been on strike since 14th February. They have not been paid since the end of February. ASUU made its strike indefinite from 29th August. The strike is over the refusal of the Federal Government to implement the Memorandum of Agreement reached with ASUU to end its nine month strike in December 2020 and includes the following demands:

- · Finalisation of re-negotiation of the 2009 Agreement
- Establishing visitation panels and publication of their results
- Replace the Integrated Payment Payroll Information System

(IPPIS) with UTAS

- · Funding of University and Tertiary Education Sector
- · Earned Allowances for both Academic and Non-Academic Staff of Nigeria's Universities
- End the proliferation of state universities without proper funding
- Payment of lecturers' withheld salaries since March 2022.

The strike by the Joint Research and Allied Institutions Sector Unions (JORAISU) continues. This involves members of the Non-Academic Staff Union of Educational and Associated Institutions (NASU) and the Senior Staff Association of Universities Teaching Hospitals Research Institutes and Associated Institutions (SSAUTHRIAI). The indefinite strike has now lasted nearly ten months having

started on 13th October, 2021. Workers in the 67 research institutes nationwide are on strike over the failure by the Federal Government to fully implement an agreement reached with the unions in 2010. The Joint Union Congress of the Police Service Commission commenced an indefinite strike from August 29 over the management of the Commission and the role of the Chair. This included the Nigeria Civil Service Union (NCSU) and Association of Senior Civil Servants of Nigeria (ASCSN) The strike was suspended on 16th September, 2022 after the Chair resigned.

The Petrol Tank Drivers of the Nigerian Union Petroleum and Natural Gas Workers (NUPENG) in Rivers State refused to load their vehicles from 12th September. This was in protests against incessant harassment by security operatives. The strike was suspended on 16th September

Climate change is due to the increased emissions of carbon dioxide and other green house gases, primarily by companies in the industrial countries. However, the most significant contribution to global warming in sub-Saharan Africa is gas flaring in the Niger Delta. Successive Nigerian governments have failed to prevent this and associated environmental damage to local communities.

In 1969 the Government gave the oil companies five years to end gas flaring. During his fist time as president, Buhari directed gas flaring to end in 1983 and introduced fines the following year. But this had little impact and flaring continued over the following decades.

The major pledge by Buhari at the Paris Climate Conference, in 2015 and subsequently, was to end gas flaring by 2030 well over fifty years after it was originally to be eradicated. But until then, Nigeria will remain one of the top seven countries for gas

The global economic system, capitalism is still firmly based on carbon fuels, oil, gas and coal. It is hard to imagine this changing without fundamental change. This includes in Nigeria where the government is still dependant for half its income on oil and so continues to turn a blind eye to gas flaring and oil spills. Minor reforms will not be enough to prevent the devastation caused by climate change. This is only expected to get worse without a change to an economic system based on human need and planning-that is socialism!

The wonderful rallies in towns and cities across the country in support of the presidential bid by Peter Obi give us hope that change is possible. But at best, moving towards implementation of the Nigeria Labour Congress (NLC) Charter of Workers *Demands*, with the support of effective mass strike action, will not be enough. The threat of further climate change, made worse by poverty and inequality, mean that fundamental change and socialism are essential.

LABOUR TO COLLABORATE WITH ASUU TO **WIN THE STRIKE**

he strike by the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) was declared in February 2022. Later they were joined by other unions in the university system including non-academic staff unions (NASU and SSANU). But these unions subsequently suspended their strikes leaving ASUU to fight

The history of this strike can be traced to the six month strike from December 2013 over the nonimplementation of the 2009 agreement (which should be revised every three years). One of the key concessions from the 2013 strike was for revitalisation of university funding. Based on a survey by a Government committee, it was agreed that N1.3 trillion would be paid over six years. The former government only made one payment of N200 billion and the current government has only made one payment of N50 billion. With inflation over the last decade of up

to 20% a year, this revitalisation fund should now be more than five trillion naira.

A further one week warning strike was held by ASUU in November 2016 and another strike from August 2017, for a month. ASUU held another strike from November 2018 that was eventually suspended in February 2019. A further nine months strike was held in 2020 that was eventually suspended with yet another agreement that the Government has again failed to implement.

It would also be noted that the background to these strikes is the very low level of funding for education by the Federal Government. In 2015, when the current Government came to power, education received over 12% of the Federal Budget, this gradually reduced to less than 6% in 2021, although it was increased to 8% for the 2022 budget.

These figures are around half the average level for other governments in sub-Saharan Africa and well below international norms. In 2002, 56 developing country governments, members of the Global Partnership for Education, agreed to spend at least of 20 per cent of their total annual budgets on education. This is supported by UNESCO which recommends that governments spend 15-20% of their budgets on education.

In his 2015 manifesto Buhari promised "Targeting up to 20% of our annual budget for this critical sector". In July 2021, at the Global Education Summit in London, President Muhammadu Buhari again promised to increase the budget for the education sector by as much as 50 per cent over the next two years. This would still only achieve half of the international norm of 20%.

The Federal Government has set up several committees to review the ASUU demands. After the last strike, a committee led by Prof Munzali Jubril was established and reported in



May 2021. But the Government took a year before it responded.

After the current strike started, the Government inaugurated the Prof Nimi Briggs committee in March 2022. This committee reported three months later, but the Government claimed it did not have the resources to fund its recommendations. On September 6, 2022, the government once again set up another committee which is chaired by the Ministry of Education

Other grievances spelt out by the striking academics include Establishing visitation panels and especially

Virtually all the public universities have been shut down for any form of academic 12 activities for the past seven months without any hope in sight in government meeting their demands. Some schools had to cancel a whole academic session for reason of the last strike. The situation is likely to repeat itself this session too.

The fact remains that the present government has shown the level of disdain it has for education, the very reason the sector is not seen as a priority area of the government. So


the alternative for the striking academics and other workers in the sector is not to give up in the struggle as the conscience of the society.

The role of the labour movement in general becomes handy here in joining hands with the workers in the sector to see to the end of the crisis being imposed by the ruling elites. The struggle has to be understood from the perspective of class rule and domination. This is against the background that the government preposition to increase school fees in the universities beyond what average income earners could afford and therefore shut the doors of university education to children of the poor. ASUU and others should be acclaimed for their social commitment in this regard as a way of saving public education.

There is therefore the need to mobilise the entire work force to save affordable public education for our own best interests. This agitation has clearly brought home that the poor do not share

the same interests with those of the privileged ruling class that are able to finance the education of their wards in universities abroad and in private universities in Nigeria. Despite this, only five percent of the university students are in the private universities as only few rich could afford the fees. In contrast nearly half of primary and secondary school students are in private schools due to the terrible underfunding of the public schools.

The NLC (with, in some states, the TUC) organised wonderful protests in every state capital in late July. These brought out hundreds of thousands of workers across the country and was a clear indication of the power possessed by the labour movement. Unfortunately, this was not followed up by a promised three day warning strike. This is obviously needed if ASUU is to be victorious and public higher education is to properly funded. If not university education will only be available to students with parents that are rich enough to afford the huge fees.

Workers should be faithful and regularly attend meetings. Workers should be faithful and committed to the goals and objectives of their unions/professional groups. We must understand that until we do this, we would remain slaves.

Problem: Poor inter-union relationships and nterprofessional rivalry – governments try to set one group of workers against another. They suppress us by dividing and uling us. We allow simple disputes or conflicts between us to keep us apart, so anytime one union or group is being hammered by authorities we simply don't care until the day it s our turn to suffer then we begin to cry.

Solution: unions and groups (professional or otherwise) must form an alliance to confront and defeat the authorities together. Whenever we take action this should involve all the relevant trade unions. It is unfortunate that ASUU is striking alone when all the higher education unions and indeed all education unions should be involved supported by the NLC

Problem: Civil Society Groups - can guide, support and stimulate unions. We need an alliance and support for trade unions, and especially striking workers, with necessary

Solution: CSOs should improve this aspect of their service to the people through strengthening their alliance with trade

Problem: Lack of intercommunity dialogue - the relationship between one community and the other is favour one community over another. Elders in our communities cannot face leaders to tell them the bitter truth, rather they prefer to be receiving favours from them. **Solution**: the people in a particular community where the political leader comes from can be used to make him/her to do



Essays On The New Global Capitalism, WILLIAM I. ROBINSON (2018)

In this book William (who had part of his education at The Transnational State is constituted as a loose network exploitation in global society, including an increasing units of analysis when looking at the political economy of the globe in the 21st Century. He argues that the nature of imperialism has changed fundamentally from the early 20th Century when Lenin described it as competition between national states to protect their national companies.

William argues that the introduction of neoliberal globalisation means that we no longer have national classes but a transnational capitalist class and a global working class. The transnational capitalist class are the owners and senior managers of the transnational corporations that now dominate world trade. They undertake two thirds of international trade and 45% of production globally. They have subcontracted their manufacturing to China and other countries in South Asia. They manage the world together through various global institutions and meet together each year at the global retreat, the World Economic Forum, at Davos each year and various international conferences. He argues that the system wide crisis that we face in the 21st century is not a repeat of the capitalist crises of the 1930s and 1970s because world capitalism is fundamentally different.

William's theory of global capitalism has four aspects. First is the rise of truly transnational capital and a new global production and financial system into which all nations and much of humanity have been integrated, either directly or indirectly. Second is the rise of a Transnational Capitalist Class, a class group that has drawn in contingents from most countries around the world, North and South, and has attempted to position itself as a global ruling class. Third is the rise of Transnational State

In terms of the Global South, Williams argues:

"Globalization has brought a vast new round of global enclosures, as hundreds of millions have been uprooted from the Third World countryside and turned into internal and transnational migrants. Some of the uprooted millions are superexploited through incorporation into the global factories, farms, and offices as precarious labor, while others are marginalized and converted into surplus humanity, relegated to a "planet of slums." Surplus humanity is of no direct use to capital. However, in the larger picture, surplus labor is crucial to global capitalism insofar as it places downward pressure on wages everywhere and allows transnational capital to impose discipline over those who remain active in the labor market." (page 241)

Global Capitalism may only describe a trend or emerging system whereby individual national capitalist classes are being replaced by a Transnational Capitalist Class. But William's ideas outlined in this book do provide useful arguments against nationalism. The idea that what we need is merely the development of national capitalism in Nigeria. This is opposed to the Marxist idea of a continuous struggle for socialism. This may start at the national level, but as Lenin recognised, will not ultimately be successful until it is victorious at the global level.

For this reason, reading at least chapters one and ten of this book provides an introduction to William's ideas that may better help us to understand the world and so change it.

In his "Message to the Grassroots" speech, Malcolm X said, "To understand this, you have to go back to what [the] young brother here referred to as the house Negro and the field Negro — back during slavery. There was two kinds of slaves. There was the house Negro and the field Negro.



he inflation rate in Nigeria is currently just over 20% according to the Central Bank of Nigeria. The prices of bread, cereals, otatoes, yam and other tubers, fish, meat, oil and fat have increased dramatically. The Consume Price Index has increased from 100 in 2009 to 463 in 2022. However, nominal or monetary wages have remained stagnant. The real wages or ourchasing power of workers has reduced rastically. Nigerian workers must examine past struggles to learn the strategies and tactics used by workers in the past in their struggles against flationary trends in the economy. A look at the struggles of Nigerian workers against inflation in 1941 offers important lessons.

Consumer Prices had generally doubled in Lagos between 1939 and 1940. In February of 1941, under the Defence Regulations (Public Notice No.15) of 1941, the Colonial State imposed price control measures on essential food items in Lagos. 

NATIONAL UNION OF PENSIONERS OR FOR PENSIONERS?

he question of involvement, democratic control and participation by their members provides a good basis to view unions in the context of either being "of" or "for" their members. The franchise in any democratic setting defines in whose interest the structure is administered. Usually, organisations are actually run in the interests of their leaders. Florid claims can't suffice to change this position.

The pensioners' union is a registered trade union but with some differences from other registered trade unions. Their members are not workers, but are pensioners. The requirements for registering employer trade unions (as with a pensioner union) are not as restrictive as the ones stipulated for normal worker trade unions. The inhibitions or preclusions are much reduced for pensioner unions compared to worker trade unions.

What therefore makes the pensioners' union unique, but still viewed as a working class organization are:-

(1) retirees are visible victims of the wage system and this should be check mated and consequently abolished along with the end of exploitation of the working class

2) membership if the pensioners' union covers

all retirees. This includes former senior and junior workers. It includes arms and non-arm bearing public servants (the security services and others). Former employees of public and private sectors are all included. Finally, essential or nonessential dichotomies crafted to split and weaken the trade unions are excluded.



h this context, the pensioners union is the organisation where you have highly seasoned and experienced people with whom an appropriate striving against the wage system can be prosecuted.

h view therefore of its composition and the relevant role it can play, time it is for this

advanced conscious contingent of the working class to appreciate how the needed subjective question of the working class can be addressed through the pensioners union.

The working class need concessions, but the primary task is to resolve the contradictions and the antagonisms between wage earners and the wage payers. The former should know and understand the sources of their wages and why they always appear to move to the minimum

Smilarly, pensioners need to understand the sources of their pensions. These may be from non-contributory schemes and more recently contributory schemes. In both cases pensioners may not be paid their pensions on time.

Trade unions and the pensioners union have the same contradictions between leaders and members. So, for example, pensioners in Borno State are complaining about the automatic deductions of their dues to the National Union of Pensioners without this body taking appropriate action to defend their members rights.

This is part of the process of democratization of trade unions. We need to support this struggle to help to build a vibrant pensioners movement.

Does Asking the Government to do More on Security Save Lives? - Alex Batubo

ome people are campaigning for the security forces to do more on security. We are facing increased insecurity, but will demanding more from the armed forces really reduce the number of people who are killed?

People have demanded that bandits, kidnappers and others be called 'terrorists' and so allow the army and others to shoot them on sight. Action by the air force in bombing the 'terrorists' has been applauded despite the increasing number of innocent deaths. This has happened here and in other countries.

The term 'terrorist' is used internationally to mean those that take up arms against the US state and its allies. Socialists and other progressive minded people should take great care when using this term. It suggests that we are aligning ourselves on the side of the US in their 'war on terror'. This is despite the American state being the organisation that inflicts more terror on the world than any other organisation.

The problem with demanding more action from the army and others to defend us from insecurity is that armies are not trained to do that. They are trained to attack an identifiable enemy in war. Armies across the world who are involved in 'counter insurgency' activity inevitably end up killing far too many innocent people.

As happened in the North East, if the army was attacked, it would go out and massacre a few people in the area where they were attacked. This is what armies across the world do when faced with such attacks. This is what appears to have happened after the recent attack on the Presidential Brigade Guards in the

After the attack, over 30 people in the Bwari area of FCT were killed by the army. Kawu and Ido villages were cleared and the army says that it recovered three weapons. Who knows who the army killed but they do not seem to have been heavily armed – one weapon for every 10 people killed? The Guards were attacked on Monday night and the retaliation was announced on Thursday. Would insurgents really stay locally after attacking the army?

The Police Commissioner for the FCT has said that they will take "the fight to the bandits and terrorists in their camps which are mostly located in states boarding the FCT". The problem is who the security forces will be able to tell the difference between local villages and 'bandit camps'.

Many innocent young men appear to be being killed in the South East by the security forces and others. On 25th July, hundreds of women and youths of Oguta local government area, Imo State, staged a protest, calling for the government Ebubeagu security outfit to be banned from operating in Oguta. They said a youth was killed the day before. At least seven others were killed in Oru West Local Government Area the week before. Two-day mass protests were held by all the communities in Oru West who barricaded the Owerri/Onitsha road.

The Nigerian army (like all armies across the world) has been guilty of many massacres. This includes the Lekki Gate killings. According to the panel of Inquiry, at least 48 protestors were shot dead (at least nine) or injured or assaulted. Another three died in the 2015 150bn attack on protestors at Alausa, Ikeja the same evening. They also massacred Shiites in Zairia in December 2015 (at least 348) and by Karu Bridge, Abuja in October 2018 (39 dead). In 1999 possibly several hundred were killed in an attack on Odi town, Bayelsa State. This was in retaliation for the killing of 12 police and an ambush of soldiers locally. In April 2013 as many as 200 civilians may have been massacred by the army in Baga a small fishing village in the far north east of Borno State.

Since this article was written we have had the Air Force killing in Kaduna and more recently six children were bombed in Niger State.

In the early hours of Saturday, 26th March, 2022, bandits invaded the Kaduna International Airport for twelve hours. 12 people were then killed by the Air Force with a helicopter attack, after one person was killed. The army spokes person said, "On arrival, the bandits were already running away. So, we engaged them through the use of ground forces. Then we called for air strike and a helicopter was deployed and from the air report, about 12 of the bandits were killed."

On 13th April 2022, the air force bombed Kurebe community in the Shiroro area of Niger State, six girls were killed by a bore hole. The Air Force had been informed that there were only bandits in the area. Budgetary Allocation to the Nigerian Army, Navy and Air Force (2015-2022)



The fundamental demand that should be made on the Nigerian state is that everything should be done within the *Constitution to protect the masses – at no* extra cost to them, but rather, with a substantial reduction of their current existential burden. No entity (state or non-state) should circumvent or abridge the known basic laws which the Nigerian state and the ruling class claim they are currently using to rule the nation. We must, with clear heads, insist on this because modern history has taught us that one clear sign of rising fascism under capitalism is the increasing inability of the state to govern by its own laws or by its own laws alone.

Beyond this central composite demand on the Nigerian state there are complementary practical demands that

International experience has shown that insecurity on the current scale in Nigeria cannot be defeated by military power and that this only results in more deaths. The underlying social and economic problems of terrible poverty, insecurity and corruption have to be addressed this is the only way to stop future killings and kidnappings. Remember the US were defeated in Vietnam and more recently in Afghanistan, the French were asked to leave Mali, Britain had to negotiate with the IRA and re-build the police in Northern Ireland.

We cannot call for more action from the security services - their guns will inevitably be turned on us and other innocent people. We need to campaign for solidarity with the tertiary education strikes, the implementation of the NLC's Charter of Workers demands (https://socialistlabour.com.ng/2022/0 7/15/nlc-charter-of-demands/) and its adoption by the Labour Party. Insecurity will only reduce when we have a fairer society.


Infectious diseases are caused by bacteria, fungi, parasites, protozoans or viruses. They can infect any of the human systems (respiratory, care policy. ASUU STRIKE. THE THREAT OF "NO WORK NO PAY" IS INAPPLICABLE -By Femi Aborisade







commend the leadership and members of ASUU for sustaining their strike for over half a year so far. The Government is clearly in a mess and does not know what to do!

The ASUU strike is lawful and justifiable. The strike is lawful by Section 30(6)(b) &(c) of the Trade Unions Act, strikes are lawfully protected where the dispute involves dispute of right and fundamental breach of contact or a Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA). ASUU's strike involves a challenge to the unimplemented 1992 Agreement with the Federal Government, which led to several subsequent Agreements arising from strike actions over the same issues. To that extent, the threat of "NO WORK NO PAY" is inapplicable to the context of ASUU strike.

The Apex Court of Nigeria has established the principle, along the spirit of Section 30(6)(b) &(c) of the Trade Unions Act that

where the act of the employer is the cause of strike action, the employees would be entitled to payment of salaries and allowances.

In Olufeagba v. Abdul-Raheem (2009) 18 NWLR 384 S. C at 441, the Supreme Court found in favour of the payment of salaries and allowances of the Appellants where '... it was the Respondents who refused to put an end to the impasse... when they refused to comply with the directive of the **National Universities Commission – the** parent body of the respondents to reinstate the appellants. On the basis of this finding, the Court held that the affected university lecturers were entitled to be reinstated and paid their salaries during the period of the strike.

In addition, by virtue of Section 254C(1)(j)(i) of the Constitution, as amended, collective agreements are

enforceable. The ASUU strike is therefore a defence of the Constitution of Nigeria against its contemptuous breach by the Federal Government.

Fundamentally, the essence of the ASUU strike is a strike to realize the provisions of Section 18(3) of the Constitution which guarantee provision of education in public institutions at the expense of the State/government.

Nigeria has more than enough resources to provide education for young people at the expense of the State. On a daily basis, we are being inundated with unimaginable amount of resources being consumed in corruption. The challenge therefore lies in what the state prioritises as important – the greed of the rulers or the basic existential needs of the

It is critically important to note that the key to accessing enjoyment of constitutionally and statutorily guaranteed rights is resolute strikes, mass action and peaceful protests as we have seen in the unfolding ASUU strike. In the face of a united strike action supported by the NLC/TUC there is nothing the National Industrial Court nor the Government can do.



Reports from a Divided Nation The American socialist and Feminist. Barbara Ehrenreich died in September 2022.

hen a hospital employee whose hospital-supplied health insurance doesn't cover her hospitalincurred bill finds her wages garnished, where's a political satirist to go for material? Feisty, fearlessly progressive Ehrenreich offers laughter on the way to tears in 62 previously published essays that show "the rich getting richer and poor getting poorer." She investigates pockets of poverty among undocumented workers, military families and recent college graduates. Ehrenreich's reach is capacious, encompassing not only unemployment, health insurance and inflation, but corporate spying, cancer studies, marriage education, the "abstinence training business" and "Disney's Princess products." Her passion, compassion and wit keep these

excursions lively and timely—even when yesterday's headlines provide the immediate provocation, e.g., JetBlue's "snow snafu." The vignettes go down a bit like eating peanuts—too many at one time palls, but they're not unhealthy, unless you have an allergic reaction to Ehrenreich's message: "America is being polarized between the superrich few and the subrich everyone else." Entertaining Ehrenreich 1Scertainly is, but she raises a hard, serious question: "How many 'wake-up calls' do we need, people...?"



WHAT IS SOCIALIST FEMINISM?

BARBARA EHRENREICH (1976)

t some level, perhaps not too well articulated, socialist feminism has been around for a long time. You are a woman in a capitalist society. You get pissed off: about the job, about the bills, about your husband (or ex), about the kids' school, the housework, being pretty, not being pretty, being looked at, not being look at (and either way, not listened to), etc. If you think about all these things and how they fit together and what has to be changed, and then you look around for some words to hold all these thoughts together in abbreviated form, you'd almost have to come up with "socialist

The Marxist/feminist understanding that class correct, and this remains the most devastating private life. Historically, late capitalist penetration and sex domination rest ultimately on force is people acquiesce to sex and class domination without being held in line by the threat of violence, class. and often without even the threat of material 4. It follows that there is a fundamental deprivation.

2. It is very important, then, to figure out what it is, if not the direct application of force, that keeps things going. In the case of class, a great deal has been written already about why the US working class lacks militant class consciousness. Certainly ethnic divisions, especially the black/white division, are a key part of the answer. But I would argue, in addition to being divided, the working class has been socially atomized. Working class neighborhoods have been destroyed and are allowed to decay; life has become increasingly privatized and inward-looking; skills once possessed by the working class have been expropriated by the capitalist class; and capitalist controlled "mass culture" has edged out almost all indigenous working class culture and institutions. Instead of collectivity and self-reliance as a class, there is mutual isolation and collective dependency on the capitalist class.

3. The subjugation of women, in the ways which are characteristic of late capitalist society, has been key to this process of class atomization. To put it another way, the forces which have atomized working class life and promoted cultural/material dependence on the capitalist class are the same forces which have served to perpetuate the subjugation of women. It is women who are most isolated in what has become an increasingly privatized family existence (even when they work outside the home too). It is, in many key instances, women's skills (productive skills, healing, midwifery, etc.) which have been discredited or banned to make way for commodities. It is, above all, women who are encouraged to be utterly passive/uncritical/dependent (i.e. "feminine") in the face of the pervasive capitalist penetration of critique of sexist/capitalist society. But there is a lot of working class life has singled out women as to that "ultimately." In a day to day sense, most prime targets of pacification/"feminization" because women are the culture-bearers of their

> interconnection between women's struggle and what is traditionally conceived as class struggle. Not all women's struggles have an inherently anticapitalist thrust (particularly not those which seek only to advance the power and wealth of special groups of women), but all those which build collectivity and collective confidence among women are vitally important to the building of class consciousness. Conversely, not all class struggles have an inherently anti-sexist thrust (especially not those that cling to pre-industrial patriarchal values) but all those which seek to build the social and cultural autonomy of the working class are necessarily linked to the struggle for women's liberation.


